The unique needs of the students in the early childhood Life Skills program will benefit from manipulatives to go along with thematic stories within the curriculum. Students will be provided the opportunity to participate in the literacy lessons at their own levels, using the storytelling kits to help in developing their language skills and expanding their vocabulary. The storytelling kits will provide an opportunity for buddy reading experiences in which all students can participate at their own level.

Swing Therapy & Sensory Integration for Students with Special Needs (\$321.94)

Students with special needs within the early childhood Life Skills program will benefit from swing therapy/sensory integration in each of the three classrooms. At times throughout the school day students require a quiet, calm place to receive vestibular input for their sensory needs. After they have received this input they are much more ready to participate in the school day activities. Sensory swings provide many benefits, such as encouraging motor planning, improving balance reaction, increasing core stability and hand strength, supporting students with low muscle tone, supporting students with sensory processing disorder, and increasing imagination. We have chosen three different swings to accommodate the various student needs within the program. Each swing requires a base and they are interchangeable.

This rack would also allow us to easily perform for assemblies and school functions, as well as possible community outreach performances, and minimize potential damage to the instruments as a result of transportation. Playing guitar can be an accessible and affordable lifelong outlet for creativity and expression, and would reach out to students who might not be involved in band, chorus or orchestra.

Incredible Bat Shows bring live bats to educational programs such as schools, churches, camps, and scout groups. They travel across the country doing shows with a variety of fruit bats, as well as some other animal options. For the Dual Language classrooms and English Language Learners, what better visual support than the animal itself? I believe it would create an in-school field trip that students would never forget!

Strike Up the Band!: Enabling Music Devices for Students with Special Needs (\$690)

The purpose of this project is to provide students with special needs the proper music instruments necessary to access our district's music curriculum. The purchases of these instruments are vital to providing all students with a rich, engaging music experience.

Bluebee Communication Buddy (\$79.43)

Through collaborative groups, OT/PT/Speech, we have seen increased participation, motivation, and interaction with the use of a mascot or stuffed animal that makes auditory noise responses. A Bluebee Pal would be more interactive and could provide verbal models from someone other than the adults in the room. Through the use of the apps that already available to the students, the Bluebee Pal can greet, ask/answer questions, provide verbal directions, and even read, play music, or play games with the students. Our students in the Life Skills classrooms often have difficulty maintaining focus, eye contact, and motivation in a given activity. The Bluebee Pal would engage their attention and encourage novel interactions without additional adult prompts.

Steamroller for Sensory Regulations to Increase Academic Performance (\$529)

The Steamroller is a device designed to provide deep pressure input to students with self-regulation difficulties, disruptive behaviors and those seeking sensory input. It can assist students with motor planning and provide sensory input needed for a student to calm, refocus and better attend to their academic environment.

Phonological Awareness Lab (\$279.86)

This project will increase kindergarten students' phonological awareness skills. Phonological awareness is the ability to recognize the sounds in words. This is one of the vital skills that children need to read and is invaluable for learning a language. This grant will provide the kindergarten teachers with an app that the students will be able to use independently. Each student's progress is monitored, and mastery is required before moving on to the next level.

Dierzen's Little Chefs (\$265)

This grant will allow us to take the students to Jewel to explore all of the food items at the store, visiting all of the various departments in the store, and will give us the opportunity to purchase food supplies that will be used throughout the year during our weekly cooking activities. Cooking with the students will increase their literacy, speech/language, and social skills.

Bringing Community to the Classroom (\$317.83)

The idea behind Bringing Community to the Classroom began with our new literacy curriculum in 2016. We read a story about a little boy whose teacher gave each student in her class a speckled notebook. The purpose of the notebook is for each student to interview all the different people they encounter in their community. My students asked if they were going to receive their own speckled notebook because we were learning about our community as well. It was great connection! I was not able to provide the notebooks that year, but I did purchase 50 with my own money the following year. This activity was the highlight of their year! It was wonderful to see the students and their families actively participate in education and community togetherness. In an effort to make this unit even more age appropriate and include classroom participation, I would like to purchase Community Helper Costumes. The students would be able to use the costumes and explore our community in the classroom through dramatic play. They would be able to interview each other and practice what they have learned. This unit from our curriculum is one of the children's favorites, it is also our final unit that serves as a culminating point in our academic year. I look forward to making their learning as interactive as possible if the D200 Education Foundation is able to fund Bringing Community to the Classroom.

From Seed to Pumpkin, A day at the Farm (\$800)

There is a larger circular area where we have a spot for larger groups. In this area we are putting seating areas. We currently have two benches there but two benches are not enough for a group of 30.

In this group, we develop leadership skills, help with the college selection and application process, provide a resume-writing workshop, and assist with financial aid and scholarship information. On October 12, 2017, we would like to take these 40 students to the University of Illinois Chicago and Loyola University Chicago. For the majority of them, this will be the first time they have stepped foot on a college campus. Without a doubt, this college experience (the sounds, sights, and smells) would be life-changing, and one which joins together students from both high schools in the pursuit of higher education.

Enhancing Business Professionalism at Woodstock High School (\$200)

Cooking for Independence (\$350)

The District 200 Life Connections Program is a transition program for 18-21 year old special needs students. This program covers the core area of transition and is designed to support special needs students in acquiring basic life skills so they can reach the highest possible level of independence in their adult life. This proposal is asking for help in reaching target goals in the transition program related to a higher level of independence for our students in their daily living skills. The key target goal that the students acquire is the ability to plan, shop, prepare, eat and clean up a simple healthy meal. Other target goals the students will acquire are healthy meal planning, consumer shopping skills, and the opportunity to apply classroom lessons to real life. Our hope is that in the future, many of our students will be living as independently as possible, either in a group home or with roommates. They will need these important skills for a better quality of life after they leave our program.

Travel Training for Independence (\$285)

The program that would be funded is the District 200 18-22 Life Connections Transition Program. This program provides special education post-high school students with many opportunities to develop their independence and increase their awareness and ability to access their community and vocational opportunities. Because many of our students do not drive, this grant would allow our students the opportunity to experience training in the use of public transportation. Providing classroom instruction on the use of public transportation would be part of the training but our students learn best when they experience actual and concrete activities. The students would experience taking MCRide to their work internships and the Metra train to explore leisure/recreational opportunities in McHenry County. Our students want to be contributing members of our community, and having the opportunity to take public transportation to navigate their way around will allow them to do just that.

Global Fest 2017-2018, A Celebration of World Languages & Cultures (\$525)
